

Still no land acknowledgemen t at County of Wellington council meetings

Some councillors want to see the process of creating one expedited, but most worry the action might be viewed as purely symbolic

"We spend money on what we value," Ballantyne said, suggesting the county could hire an Indigenous consultant trauma that we are to create a land acknowledgement as their time on top of opposed to relying on their full time jobs the volunteer committee.






Authentic Relationships
